

2. Rafael

Born Rio de Janeiro, Brazil Age 23 Appearances 116(15) Goals 5

Much like David De Gea, Rafael had a season to remember in 2012/13 as he crossed over from promising youngster to essential first-teamer. The Brazilian is the epitome of the modern full-back: roving forward as an extra attacker to overload opposition defences, yet mindful of his role in protecting the flanks and his centre-halves. Rafa's pace and boundless energy allow him to control the right wing from back to front and after two belting strikes against Liverpool and QPR, you can be on him eyeing up the top corner as soon as he overcomes a hamstring injury.





3. Patrice Evra

Born Dakar, Senegal Age 32 Appearances 314(21) Goals 7

There's been little debate over United's left-back position in recent years. For six seasons running, Patrice Evra has notched up more than 40 appearances in all competitions, and last term he even added goals to his game, often appearing unnoticed at set-pieces as defenders marked the more obvious towering targets. Now 32. he has a bucketload of top-level experience, remains hugely popular in the dressing room and the Old Trafford stands and will doubtless be happy to take the captain's armband again if required in 2013/14.





4. Phil Jones

Born Preston, England Age 21 Appearances 55(11) Goals 2

No-one thrives in the heat of battle quite like Phil Jones. He runs at the opposition as if with bayonet fixed and hurls himself into defensive manoeuvres with little thought for his own safety. That's not to say, though, that he isn't blessed with considerable footballing skills - he can go past players with real dynamism. while his deceptive turn of pace and good reading of the game are the prime assets for a centre-half. Under new management, it'll be fascinating to see where his role evolves at United. Full-back, centre-back, midfielder: he can play them all, but Jones is no mere utility player. He has the potential - as noted by such sage commentators as Sir Bobby Charlton to be as good as any English player of any era.

5. Rio Ferdinand

Born London, England Age 34 Appearances 423(9) Goals 8


His testimonial has been marked, but it's certainly not time yet to wave farewell to the longest-serving defender in the United squad. His quality and consistency in 2012/13 moved Sir Alex to call it "his best season at the club" - at the age of 34. He retains the unflappable, ball-playing composure that has long been his hallmark (and which rubs off on his defensive cohorts), and always seems to be in the right place, snuffing out threats and putting out fires. A contract extension keeps him at the club at least until next summer, but who knows? He's got five years on Ryan Giggs...

6. Jonny Evans

Born Belfast, Northern Ireland Age 25 Appearances 140(16) Goals 5

No longer the apprentice, Jonny Evans is now one of the senior pros in the defensive group and his displays in last season's title win underline that fact. In essence he has developed his game to bear similar characteristics to both his senior peers: seriously powerful in the air and the tackle in the manner of Vida, yet with the anticipation, ball control and eye for a pass of Rio. All in all it gives the new manager a welcome headache in deploying his forces in the centre of defence – with Jonny at his disposal, David Moyes has a centre-half equipped at the very highest level.



15. Nemanja Vidic

Born Uzice, Serbia Age 31 Appearances 259(8) Goals 19

The club captain's importance to United's defensive ramparts is evident from a before-and-after comparison of last season's goals against column. After his September injury, United conceded 22 goals in the 14 league games to Boxing Day from which Vidic was absent. In Vida's next 13 league games to the end of the season we conceded a mere seven. His knee worries of recent campaigns have hopefully now passed, and we can anticipate a season of granite durability from the Reds' Serbian rock. Vida's presence will be vital as the first shots of the title race are fired.



12. Chris Smalling

Born Greenwich, London Age 23 Appearances 63(23) Goals 3


Chris had a rotten time with injuries last season and will be hoping for a long spell off the treatment table as the 2013/14 campaign kicks off. When fit and firing he's shown himself as a classy defensive asset, principally at centre-half or alternatively at full-back (for club and country), giving his manager a viable option against the teams in which there is a clear aerial threat.



22. Fabio

Born Rio de Janeiro, Brazil Age 23 Appearances 36(17) Goals 2

After a season-long loan at QPR, Fabio need look no further for inspiration than his twin brother Rafael, who has emerged as first-choice right-back in United's strongest defence. Fabio has the skills to prosper likewise – he started the 2011 Champions League final and will be determined to hit those heights again.



28. Alexander Büttner

Born Doetinchem, Netherlands Age 24 Appearances 12(1) Goals 2

Büttner was an under-theradar signing from Dutch
club Vitesse Arnhem last
summer but has provided
energetic left-back cover
with some eye-catching
performances, notably with
a mazy run and goal on his
debut against Wigan at Old
Trafford. The Reds' young
Dutch defender loves to
attack, so look out for his
surging runs on the left flank.
